

Mrs. Aminta E. Green

Mrs. Aminta E. Green, daughter of the late Sophia Mary Parham Moxley, and James Isom Fisher, of Baltimore, Md. And widow of Charles Green, of Savannah, Gs., died at her residence 1701 Park Place, Baltimore, Monday, March 16th, 1908 after an illness of several weeks.

She was an active member of Babcock Memorial Presbyterian Church, and was formerly president of the Young Women's Christian Association, and was active in the Women's Christian Temperance Union, and the McAll French Mission. Mrs. Green founded the Female Christian Home, and several years ago established a seaside summer rest-home for returned missionaries at Old Orchard, Me. This home is known as "Minnie's Seaside Rest" and is a memorial to her only daughter who died in 1878. Two years ago she established a manse for the Presbyterian Church at Greenwich, Virginia, known as the "Moxley Memorial Manse."

The funeral services were held at 5 P. M. on Wed., Mar. 18th, from her home, and were conducted by Rev. John Timothy Stone, assisted by Rev. E. A. McAlpin, Jr. Dr. B. M. Hopkinson sang, as a solo, her favorite hymn, which she had requested would be sung, during her recent illness, namely, "In Emmanuel's Land." The internment was made at Greenwich, Va., beside the body of her husband, the late Charles Green, who was a prominent merchant of Savannah, Ga. The services at Greenwich were held on Mar. 19th, 1908, and the committal service in the Churchyard was conducted by Rev. Garland Hamner, of Manassas, Va.

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
